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Paragraph Worksheet for Writing & Speaking

Paragraphs are groups of sentences that have a single idea. A paragraph typically includes:

Structure of a paragraph For example: - Topic Sentence Making a good cup of tea is easy if you follow these steps. First, boil some water. Next put some hot water in - Supporting Sentences → the teapot to warm it. Then pour the water out of the pot and put in some tea leaves. You will need one teaspoon of tea leaves for each cup of tea you want. Then pour the boiling water into the teapot. Cover the pot and wait Concluding Sentence a few minutes. Then the tea will be ready to drink.

Topic Sentence: Write a sentence that states the main idea or topic of a paragraph.

Supporting Sentences: Write facts or descriptions that relate to the topic.

Concluding Sentence: Re-word(phrase) the introduction to sum up the ideas in the

paragraph and bring it to a close.

Principles of Writing a Paragraph

• A topic sentence is the most important sentence in a paragraph.

Topic Sentence 'The controlling idea' 'The topic'

- The topic sentence contains two parts: the topic and the controlling idea.
- In other words, every topic sentence will have a topic and a controlling idea.

Examples: • Topic Sentence:

There are two reasons why pollution in XXX Town is the worst in the world.

(a controlling idea) (a topic)

Being an English teacher requires certain characteristics.

(a topic) (a controlling idea)

Making a sandwich is easy if you know the steps.

(a topic) (a controlling idea)

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The controlling idea shows the direction the paragraph will take. In other words, the controlling idea limits the contents of supporting sentences.

Example

Supporting Sentences

controlled by the controlling idea 'follow these steps'

Concluding Sentence

Topic Sentence = Controlling idea Topic

Making a good cup of tea is easy if you follow these steps.

First, boil some water. Next put some hot water in the teapot to warm it. Then pour the water out of the pot and put in some tea leaves. You will need one teaspoon of tea leaves for each cup of tea you want. Then pour the boiling water into the teapot. Cover the pot and wait

a few minutes. Then the tea will be ready to drink.

 Supporting sentences after a topic sentence have to give more information about the Controlling idea, 'follow these steps'.

Remember: The topic sentence is usually the first sentence or last sentence, but it can be any sentence in the paragraph!

Characteristics of Effective Concluding Sentences

It is important for you to know how to write effective concluding sentences. Some characteristics include:

- Reviewing main points mentioned in a paragraph
- Restating(paraphrasing or reword) the topic sentence
- Do not introduce new ideas or topics

Examples of concluding sentence starters include:

- In conclusion • To sum up
- To summarize
- Overall

- Indeed
- In short
- In brief

- All in all
- To comclude
- · As you can see,
- For these reasons
