
# **Pumpkins in Water!**



"The pumpkins are too heavy!" said Ben. "We'll sink into the water," said Cooper. "I can't swim!" cried Derek. The pool sank into the stream, and their pumpkins were **carried away**. All four children fell into the water. "Help us!" cried Derek out of breath.

But, just then, grandpa appeared from the path. He witnessed the four children floundering in the water, so he dove in unquestioningly. One by one, he pulled

them out of the stream. Mom and dad came running from the house and they hugged and kissed all the little children.  $\star They$  were relieved, but also furious. "I told you not to go near that stream," mom said. "We just wanted some pumpkins to make jack-o'-lanterns," said Derek with a sulky face. "You are grounded for a week as a punishment," mom responded. "It's unfair. I tried to persuade them not to do that," said Cooper. "You should hold yourselves responsible for your behavior, " mom said seriously.

■enormous[adj]	extremely large in size, quantity, or extent The blue whale is an <b>enormous</b> animal that can be over one hundred feet in length.
■ comply[v]	to act in agreement with or obedience to a wish, request, requirement, or rule The school has a dress code, but some students do not <b>comply</b> .
■ transport[v]	to convey from one place to another; carry. Ships <b>transport</b> the oil from the Middle East to the importing countries.
■ float[v]	to stay on the surface of a liquid and not sink The snack raft was light enough to <b>float</b> on the water.
■ witness[v]	to watch or be present at The victims have appealed for anyone who <b>witnessed</b> the incident to contact them.
■ crooked[adj]	not forming a straight line or being bent The <b>crooked</b> path leads you to the temple.
■flounder[v]	to struggle clumsily, often losing balance or headway The girl was <b>floundering</b> around in the deep end of the swimming pool.
■furious [adj]	full of fury; violently angry The press was <b>furious</b> with me and criticized me for weeks and weeks.
relieved[adj]	no longer feeling dirtressed or anxious We were <b>relieved</b> at the news of their safe return.






