# A Strange Night

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### (Gerunds) object of a verb

- A gerund is a verb with an '-ing' ending that functions as a noun in a sentence. A
  gerund can be used as the subject of a sentence, the subject complement of the
  linking verb be, the object of a preposition, or the object of a verb. You can also
  use adverbs or adverbial phrases to modify gerunds.
- A gerund can function as a direct object of the verb or indirect object of the verb.
   Some verbs only require gerund form as an object. Examples are 'delay, enjoy, finish, keep, give up, mind, postpone, put off, quit, suggest, avoid, admit, and stop.'

#### Example

Did you **practice kicking** from the sideline?

Kylie does not appreciate being touched again.

We **proposed not postponing** the annual conference.

Students anticipated going to the picnic this weekend.

The ballerina will teach them **dancing to classical music**.

## Unit **1** A Strange Night

I decide to continue walking in the desert, even after my encounter with the octopus creature chasing me. The reason I'm here, is to find my uncle, Louis. He used to tell me that he **considered living in the desert** his entire life.He felt he could truly be alone with his thoughts in a place like that. (a)

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As I walk ahead, the dark spot before me grows until I can see it's a small house with a flat roof and a narrow door. I think that might be his house, so I open the door and get inside. "Louis!" I call. "Louis, are you here?" There's no response **but** a barking dog. I'd recognize that bark anywhere—Chelsea! My uncle's dog dances around my feet. When I pick  $\star him$  up, he licks me passionately. It takes a minute for my vision to adjust to the dimness, but when it does, I see a comfortable-looking bed. The bed looks so comfortable. Since I've been walking for so long, I need to rest. I climb onto the bed, and Chelsea curls up next to me. In seconds, we are fast asleep. (b)

It's dark when I wake up. After I perceive something moving in the sands outside, I freeze. It shifts again, just barely **audible** above Chelsea's gentle snores. I **avoid making noise** and slowly climb off the bed. Through the window, I can see the silky sand outside the entrance and something underneath moving. A small lump, a little smaller than Chelsea, shifts around the area in front of the house. (c)

If it is one of those things, that thin door won't keep it out and I have no place to flee to. Suddenly, Chelsea jumped off the bed, and he's scratching the door before I could grab him. "Louis! Louis, you in there?" The voice is coming from outside. "Louis?" I whisper, confused. That thing couldn't be talking about my uncle. "Open the door, if you're in there." the thing continues talking. "Louis's not here!" I shout. The thing **stops moving** for a

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moment, then it screams, "Thief! Burglar!" "I'm not one of those things," I answer. The thing pauses, and its tentacles **have stopped flailing**. I can feel ★*it* thinking. "How do you know my uncle?" I asked. "Let me in, and I'll tell you," it replied. But I don't want to **risk confronting danger**. "I've already been attacked by one horrible tentacled creature in the desert. How can I trust you and open the door?" "I'm hardly horrible," it scoffs. "I **admit having frightended you** but it wasn't my intention. Calling me such offends my fragile sensibilities." I cautiously stand and slowly open the door. (d) ■




