Firstly, through outward appearances, you can notice the person's character. A wellmannered person knows what kind of outfit suit each occasion. On the other hand, a person who insists on his own style in every occasion lacks social awareness. For example, you can tell at first sight that a woman wearing a clean suit at a wedding is a nice person, but if she were to come in sweat pants and flip flops, it could be deducted from her actions that she is a very disrespectful person. (Listen Carefully: Secondly, it is possible to predict how good a person is with self-management. Heavy people claim that they were born that way and believe they will become beautiful once they lose weight, but because they think they gain weight by just drinking water, they say that there is nothing they can do about their body size.
