

(Adjectives & Adverbs) so

- We can use so and such to make the meaning of an adjective, adverb or noun stronger (=very). We can also use so and such to mean 'like this'. We can use so with an adjective or adverb to make it stronger. With a noun or adjective + noun, we use such to make it stronger. We often use these so and such structures with that and a clause to say what the result is.
- We use 'so much + uncountable noun + (that)' or 'so many + plural noun + (that)'.

 When we use much, many, little and few with a noun, we use **so** to make it stronger.

Example

Harper is **so** rich that she has her own house.

The house is **so** big that it is easy to get lost.

When I visited her, she walked so fast that I couldn't follow her.

Her dog slept **so** deeply that it didn't notice me wandering.


