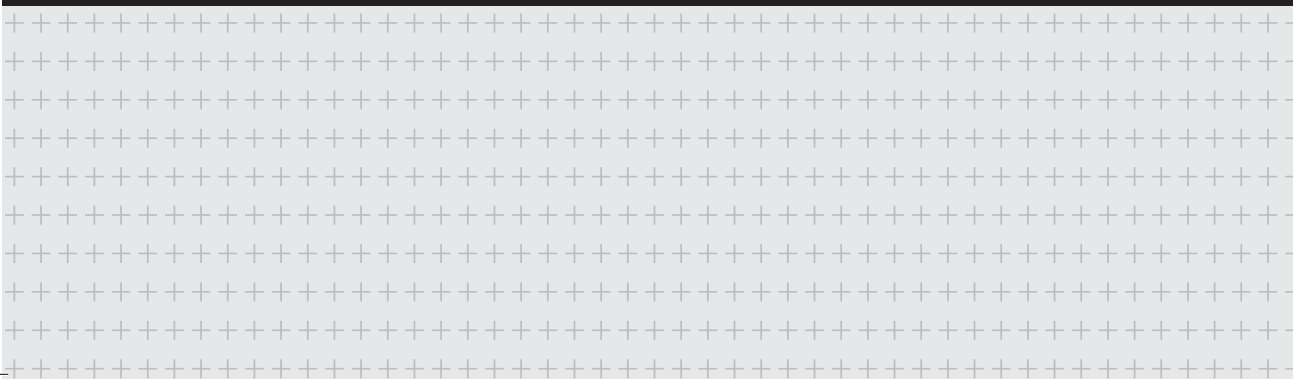

UNIT 01

Where do people live? What makes a home for humans? Did **you** know everyone's house is different? It can be big or small, made of wood or brick. A house is one kind of home. **It stands on its own**, not like an apartment. It has its own roof and a front door. Sometimes, there's a backyard where you and **I** can play, each adding something special to its purpose.

Apartments are another kind of home. They have one roof. Neighbors live under the same roof but on different **floors**. A cabin is another kind of home, often built out of logs and near a forest. It has trees and birds as neighbors.

The other kind of home is a motorhome. It has wheels that can move from place to place. A houseboat is another unique home; **you** can live on the water! ★**It** has fish and other boats as neighbors, which is really cool.

Homes come in various kinds. Even though they all give us a place to live, each one can be special and different. They don't just look different; they can be in unique locations too. **I** once saw a house made of banana leaves in a faraway jungle! Which kind of home would **you** like to stay in?

▪ roof[n]	the structure that covers or forms the top of a building or vehicle The corner of the classroom was damp where the roof had leaked.
▪ cabin[n]	a small, simple house made of wood He lived in a cabin to be close with nature.
▪ neighbor[n]	a person who lives next to you or near you We've had a lot of support from all our friends and neighbors .
▪ motorhome[n]	a large vehicle designed for people to live and sleep in when they are travelling He bought a motorhome for his road trip across the United states.
▪ kind[n]	a group of people or things that are the same in some way What kind of house do you live in?
▪ purpose[n]	the intention, aim or function of something The plan achieved its primary purpose , if nothing else.
▪ various[adj]	several different She took the job for various reasons.
▪ unique [adj]	being the only one of its kind Everyone's fingerprints are unique .
▪ location [n]	a place where something happens or exists We still do not know the precise location of the crash.
