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## Unit 01 Who Hides, Slides, and Hisses?

Imagine a male snake. Where does he live? **He** probably **stayed** on land or near water and avoids cold places all year round. Snakes, as reptiles, are cold-blooded and have backbones. They have a remarkable ability to camouflage themselves in their surroundings and **regulate** their body temperature by moving to different places.

Snakes in colder places go into hibernation, finding spots where the temperature doesn't change much. In warmer places,  $\star they$  are more active. Since snakes don't have legs, they move by sliding their belly against a surface.

As a snake grows, its skin stretches and sheds, revealing new skin and scales beneath. This process is called shedding, and snakes don't keep the same skin and scales they were born with.

Now, think about a female snake. Where did you think **she laid** her eggs? Most snakes lay their eggs in a safe place, while some mothers carry eggs in their bodies. In these cases, the eggs hatch inside their bodies, and the baby snakes come out!

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Suppose a male snake successfully hunts prey. How does he hunt? Initially, he used his tongue to find prey, but **he** also **relied** on a unique body part that can sense heat. He follows the heat, like a dog following a smell. When he catches his meal, he swallows it **in its entirety**, as snakes can't chew. A snake's jaw is so big that it can swallow prey larger than its head!

Now that you've learned more about snakes, what do you think of them?

■ camouflage[v]	to hide by coloring or covering to look like the surroundings The lizard can <b>camouflage</b> and blend in with the leaves to hide from other animals.
■ temperature[n]	degree of hotness or coldness measured on a scale Water boils at a <b>temperature</b> of 212°F.
■shed[v]	to cast off, take off, or let fall In autumn, trees <b>shed</b> their leaves, and the ground is covered with colorful foliage
■ rely[v]	to trust or depend (usually followed by "on" or "upon") During the camping trip, we <b>rely</b> on the compass to show us the right direction in the woods.
■scale[n]	any of the thin plates of hard material that cover the skin of many fish and reptiles The beast was a dragon with green <b>scales</b> .
■ hatch[v]	to break an egg so a baby animal can come out The bird <b>hatched</b> out the next day.
■ sense[v]	to feel or be aware of something It works when it <b>senses</b> rain.


