01 (Determiners) Many, much, a lot of

- We use *many*, *much* to refer to a large number of something.
- We use *many* for countable nouns, and *much* for uncountable nouns.
- We also use *a lot of* in same way, which can be used with all kinds of nouns.

Example

We are looking for some foods to cook.
 There are **a lot of** potatoes.
 But there are not **many** onions.
 Do you have sugar? We need **much** sugar to make a cookie.
 Don't use too **much** sugar!
